There are 58,600 Kansas family farmers and ranchers operating 45.7 million acres of cropland, pasture, and forestland. During 2021, the Kansas farm economy was the nation's 6th largest with gross receipts from the sales of crops and livestock at \$24.5 billion. 1/2/




Recent Enrollment In USDA **Conservation Programs** 4/5/



Crop Insurance Enrollment

During 2021, Kansas farmers and ranchers insured 21.7 million acres and over \$6.1 Billion in crops and livestock liabilities. Total indemnity payments due to natural disasters or insured revenue declines totaled \$278 Million. As part of the federal crop insurance program, Kansas producers paid more than \$888 Million in insurance premiums. 6/

NEED-BASED INCOME SUPPORT FOR FARMERS (TITLE | SUPPORT 2019 TO 2020) 5/



The Farm Service Agency offers loans to help farmers and ranchers get the financing they need to start, expand or maintain a family farm. **Operating Loans** can be used to purchase livestock, seed and equipment. It can also cover farm operating costs and family living expenses while a farm gets up and running. **Farm Ownership Loans** can be used to purchase or expand a farm or ranch. This loan can help with paying closing costs, constructing or improving buildings on the farm, or to help conserve and protect soil and water resources. 5/


Kansas Individuals Participating In USDA's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Programs 7/

USDA's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) provides nutrition benefits to supplement the food budget of needy families so they can purchase healthy food and move towards self-sufficiency. Over 96 thousand Kansas families participated in SNAP during the 2021 fiscal year, with an average benefit of \$422 per household per month to purchase food items.
